OPIOID USE DISORDER ECHO



Over 100,000 people died last year from overdoses, the majority of which were related to opioids. Medications are the **most** effective intervention for treating people with OUD. **Anyone who prescribes medication can now prescribe buprenorphine.** While medications to treat OUD are safe and effective, many people do not feel confident when prescribing them.

ECHO uses videoconferencing to connect interdisciplinary teams of experts. The OUD ECHO helps professionals integrate medical, pharmacological, and psychological considerations into patient care.
